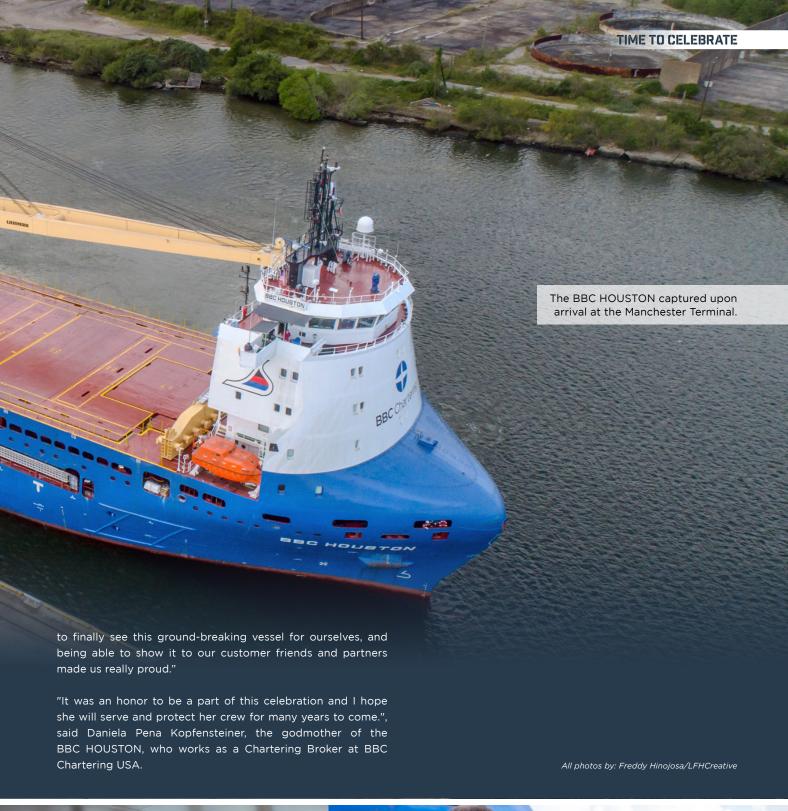

It was a bright, sunny, and warm late summer day when a crowd of 150 guests, including clients, partners and employees of BBC, representatives from Briese, BREB and BlueWaterBREB and representatives of the City of Cuxhaven and the port, gathered at the BlueWaterBREB-Terminal in Cuxhaven to give the BBC LEER, the series, a proper welcome on her first call at a German port.

The BBC LEER had arrived at Cuxhaven around noon on 16 September and berthed at berth no. 8 at the BlueWater-BREB Terminal. Discharge operations commenced, and accompanied by a close coordination process between customer, terminal and our operations department, the cargo, which consisted of a full load of windmill blades from Mexico, was discharged well in time to allow for thorough preparation of the welcome event.

The event on 20 September kicked off with a welcome speech by our Manager Knut Kokkelink and Jürgen

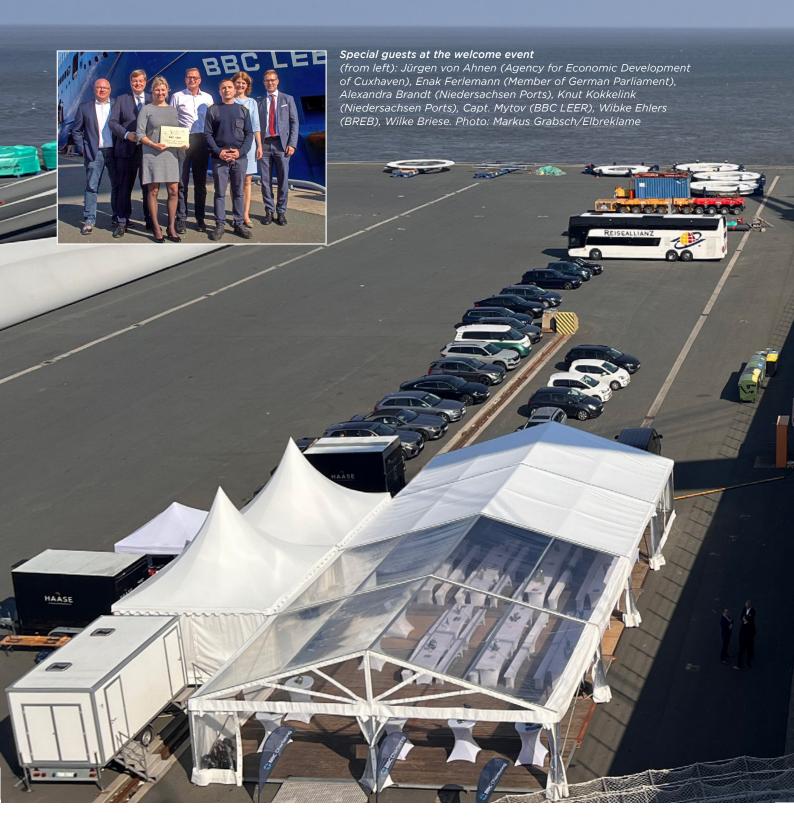

von Ahnen, Head of the Agency for Economic Development of Cuxhaven, who represented the mayor. Two more speeches by Enak Ferlemann and Stefan Wenzel, Parliamentary State Secretary with the Minister for Economic Affairs and Climate Protection followed. Both are Members of the Bundestag having their electoral districts in Cuxhaven.

After the speeches it was time for everyone to get on board the BBC LEER and take a closer look at the new vessel. The forward hatch covers were closed with the aft hatch covers open, allowing for a view into the cargo hold with tween deck pontoons put in place to demonstrate the versatility of the triple decker. The crane hooks of

the forward crane were lowered and secured to give visitors an impression of the size of these crucial parts which play an important role in cargo handling A visit to the bridge was also part of the tour after which everyone was invited to enjoy the barbeque offered







HIDING BEHIND THE STORM

In November 2023 BBC Project Division started to work on a shipment of 10 reels from Kalundborg (DK) and Rosyth (UK) to Bata, Equatorial Guinea. Beginning of January 2024, BBC was nominated by our client DeepOcean for this project. An empty carousel from Rotterdam to Bintan Island was added to this interesting voyage.

For DeepOcean it was very important to meet the given loading dates, as the cargo had to be placed in time on berth at Bata, so that the specialized construction vessel MV "Edda Freya" could start installation work in time. The best fit for this project was BBC Amber. Due to stowage reasons, we started with the loading of the carousel in Rotterdam. In meantime DeepOcean informed us, that one unit got no road transport permission from Great Yarmouth to Rosyth. To help our client, we decided to add the port Great Yarmouth as a 3rd loading port for DeepOcean to load this unit prior proceeding to Kalundborg and Rosyth.

On this shipment, we very much had to focus on the weather conditions not only for the safety of the crew and vessel but also for the deck cargo. Bad weather conditions caught us already prior berthing at Great Yarmouth. The harbors

tugboat was not strong enough to get our vessel safely alongside. The berthing operation had to be suspended and the ship was brought back to anchorage. Already at this point of time, we had the cable tower and basket to Bintan Island on deck. After 1,5 days the weather conditions finally improved.

After loading in Kalundborg, the vessel stopped at Gothenburg for bunkering and continued her trip to Rosyth. While we were alongside in Northern England, the weather was fine but the forecast already showed that our Biscay passage will become a challenge. For the safety of everybody, the ships command together with the OPS department decided to stay two days longer in Rosyth allowing the conditions in Biscay to improve. On March 22nd we slowly headed towards English Channel to be ready when a "good" weather windows will open up.

The approach, strategy and execution of vessels command was well set. On Feb 26th, the vessel entered Biscay and first had to deviate north to keep clear of the slowly improving condition. One day later on Feb 27th, the vessel successfully passed Biscay and after some still rough hours alongside the Portuguese coast, we safely departed from Europe towards

Bata for discharging of the reels and accessories.

As per our crew: "The waves were more than 6 meters. But vessel and crew strongly withstood all weather challenges, under sensitive guidance of our Captain!" During the booking of this cargo, maritime news also reported an attack on a tanker north Principe Island (São Tomé Country). Therefore, it has been agreed to sail around São Tomé Island and approach Bata from the south.

After being safely alongside in Bata, the discharging operation offered more challenges. The reels not only had to be placed in between fixed stationary harbor cranes but also in a specific order to match our clients requirements. Aforesaid sequence requested quite some shifting activities of the vessel alongside the berth enabling us to reach the different onshore storage positions.

The crew reported: "On arrival in port Bata (Equatorial Guinea) we realized that the ordeal was not over. Strong swell requested a lot of attention and efforts from us to safely land the cargo. The constant shifting operation exhausted the crew as well. Nevertheless, we all endured the difficulties given to us. All cargo was



discharged in safe working practice. The good news was, that we were warmly welcomed by local authorities, agent and inspector, showing and telling us about their country. "

After vessels departure, the client performed our "lessons learned and performance evaluation" which was completed with the highest rating and compliments for the performance of the BBC Amber crew.

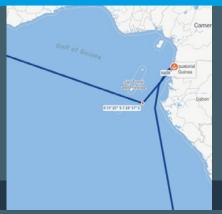

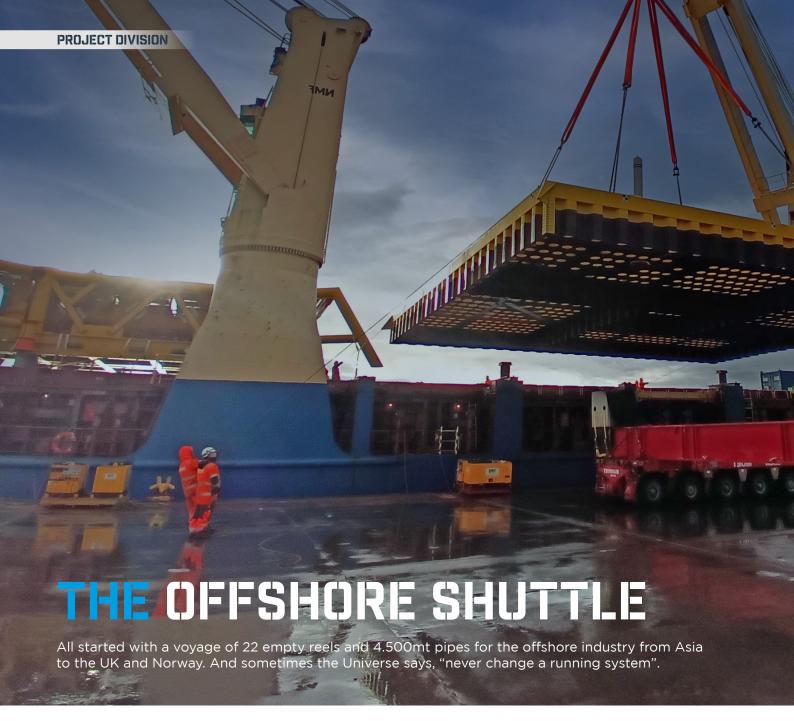

Part 1

While the BBC Xingang was on the way to Europe to deliver the reels and pipes, the BBC Project Division booked with offshore EPC Saipem a voyage of subsea equipment from Nigg, UK to their vessel VM "Saipem 3000".

Fun Fact: We had been carrying this cargo already from Asia to the UK on our BBC RUSHMORE. Normally you would think, this would make the story easy, but it was the opposite. This trip from Asia to the UK had been taken over from a competitor, together with the technical planning. From our point of view, planned lashing was a little more than needed and we optimized same for the voyage of BBC Xingang. This optimizing idea did not work out, after 3 weeks of almost daily meetings we found a compromise.

The next question was where to find the MV "Saipem 3000"? The client kept it open, if we meet her in Dakar or maybe en route in Las Palmas. Finally BBC Xingang has been ordered to Almeria in Spain, where the S3000 was stuck in the yard. After a few days of discussions and investigations, whether the cargo can be discharged to berth, or if the BBC Xingang has to wait for the S300 to complete her yard stay and take the cargo directly, the cargo was finally discharged to berth.

Part 2

While the BBC Xingang was on the way to Nigg for the above voyage, The BBC Project Division booked cargo for offshore EPS Subsea7. A reel, an umbilical basket and other subsea equipment from Dusavik and Kalundborg have been schedule for Dakar. Having the BBC Xingang voyage to

Almeria in mind, the was the perfect fit to perform also this new voyage, which has been completed by another pipe cargo from Antwerp to Libreville. From a project managing point of view it was a much less complicated job.

Part 3

The initial planning for voyage 1 was containing 2 offshore frames, which haven't been loaded. These two frames haven been still resting in Nigg and needed a lift to Dakar. As we said in the beginning; never change a running system. Saipem booked these frames with BBC and clearly asked to perform this voyage with BBC Xingang.

The technical planning ashore was again a bit more complicated then expected, but much faster than on voyage one.



shore crew. It's a just normal way of business, that things change and have to be adjusted, but his help was much appreciated.

One of the most interesting moments was the discharging of HL units on DP3 Supplier during last call in Dakar. It was a new level of cooperation between 4 parties - 2nd Officer on ballast, Ch. Officer on deck of supplier, DP operator, and our Crane driver. Prior actual discharging all engaged parties had a conversation, where was discussed main attention required points. Main challenge was that the position for HL units was not only marked, but also pre-welded with stoppers. So the gap was about 5cm only, which is actually not too much, when we are talking about ship-to-ship cargo ops.

So, during the tool box meeting everyone explained his point of view, regarding most complicated moments, because positioning of HL unit should be done without any stops (due to specific work of brakes in our type of crane). Captain Alex Chernov and Chief Officer Alex Ivanenko approved a plan and we proceeded with the discharging. Supplier's crew was also engaged under C/O command. It was decided to use 10t rachets as a direction and tug lines. Main point was that everyone should work simultaneously and synchronized from the beginning and until zero load on the hook.

The performance of all parties was on high level and cargo operations were completed without any notes from any side. We are looking forward for new interesting challenges and will be happy to work with those companies in future.

All 3 voyages required high HSEQ standards, a valid CMID certification of the BBC Xingang and each time fresh re-certification of the lifting and lashing material. After such projects it is a BBC standard procedure to require lessons learned and a performance evaluation from the clients, which has been assessed with the highest rating and compliments for the performance of the BBC Xingang crew. It also shows again the professional work style and cooperation of BBC operations, BBC technical department, Briese ISM and Briese inspection.

We thank Master Nikita Tcymbalov, Operator Kristina Harms, Master Alex Chernov and their entire crew(s) for their professional work and performance!



On the way up to Nigg, an intermediate stop was planned in Flushing to start the first preparations for the loading in Nigg. Again the final discharging location, except the port of Dakar, was not 100%. Different berth options and discharging to offshore barges have been discussed. The final decision turned then into discharging to offshore barges.

2nd officer of BBC Xingang Anton Litvinov said: First of all it was a pleasant experience to work with companies that have that high standards in safety and performance. We took and shared some lessons in organization of toolbox meetings and cooperation between vessel and shore. I would also like to thank and appreciate our Port Captain Mr. Robert Muhr, whose knowledge and experience was invaluable during meetings with

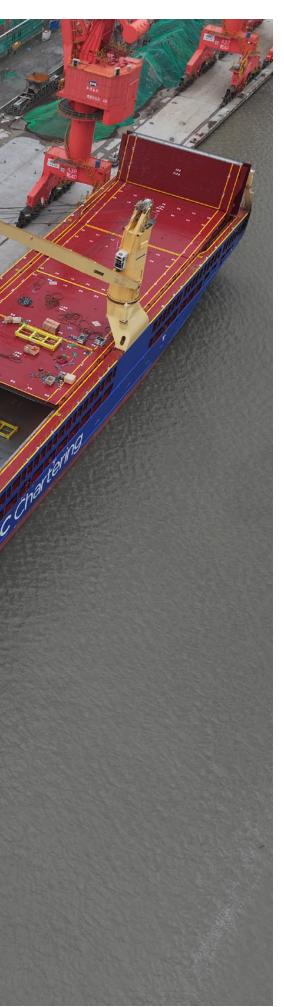
MALA Award

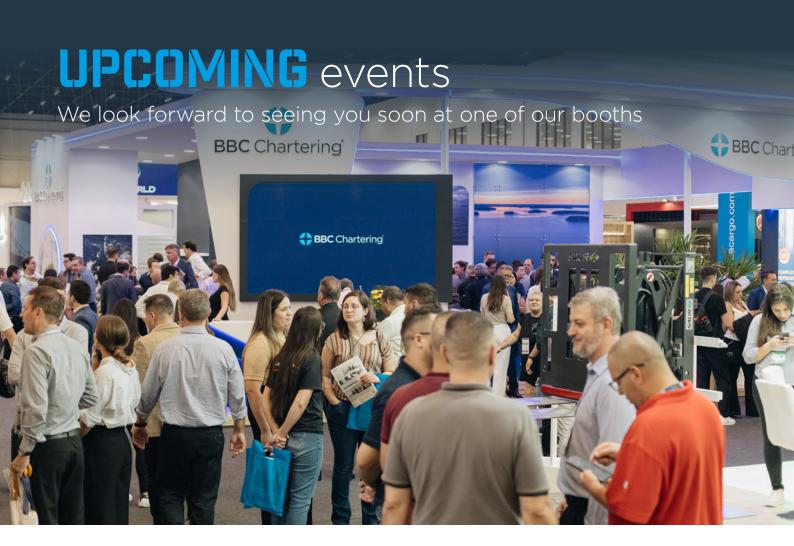
